The Cambridge Health Department joined in the fun and set up a table with giveaways and valuable information for dads and their children. Sergeant Antonie Patton of the Cambridge Police Department led in coordinating to have members of the CPD come out and join the fun. The officers had children wear goggles that make it appear as though you are intoxicated, and then try to walk a straight line and pick candy up off the ground. Another officer brought a police dirt bike that kids excitedly climbed on pretending they were on "a chase".
